



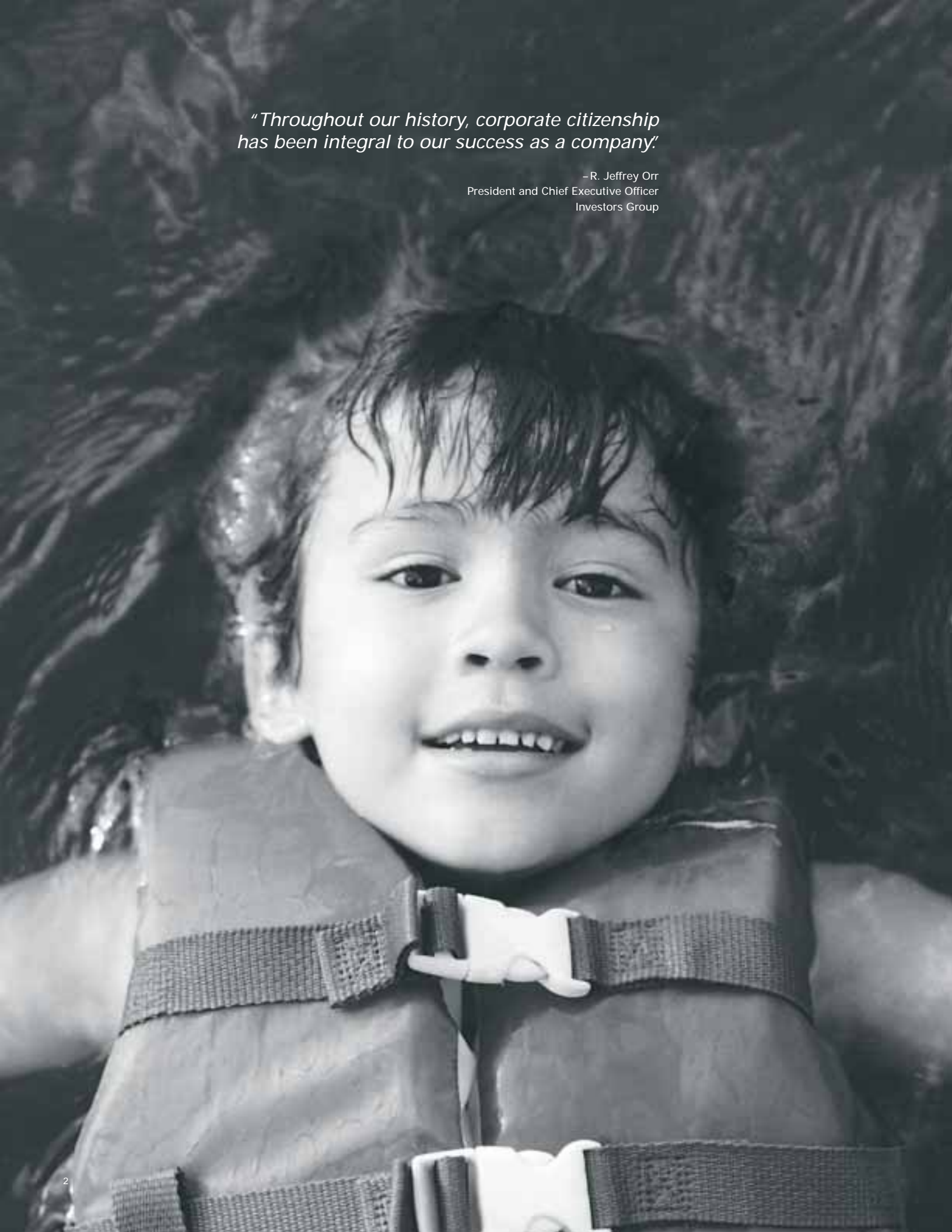

PROVIDING COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Investors Group donates at least one per cent of its average annual pre-tax income to charitable and other non-profit organizations. This corporate allocation totalled more than \$4 million in 2001, not including additional amounts contributed by Investors Group’s offices and individuals on their own initiative. Community investments are made in four general ways:

Grassroots involvement

All offices across the country can acquire funding in order to participate with deserving local causes and events, largely of their own choosing, in the categories of arts and culture, civic causes, education, health, social services, amateur sport and recreation. This represents the primary focus of our community relations activities.

National projects

We have a track record of involvement with specific and targeted national causes and organizations, especially in the education and amateur sports segments.

Encouraging volunteers

Investors Group Consultants, employees, retirees and their immediate families can apply for grants to benefit the non-profit organizations they serve as volunteers.

Matching donations

Qualifying personal donations made by Investors Group personnel to registered Canadian charities are matched on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

In addition, Investors Group is designated as a “Caring Company” by Imagine, a program undertaken by the Canadian Centre for Philanthropy to promote community participation and citizenship among corporations coast-to-coast.

According to Terry Wright, the year 2001 included significant community relations developments for the company as a whole. “We continued to encourage the active participation of our workforce, and maintained important national programming,” he says. “We also improved the ability of our office network to become involved with worthwhile local causes, to better support the needs of individual communities.”

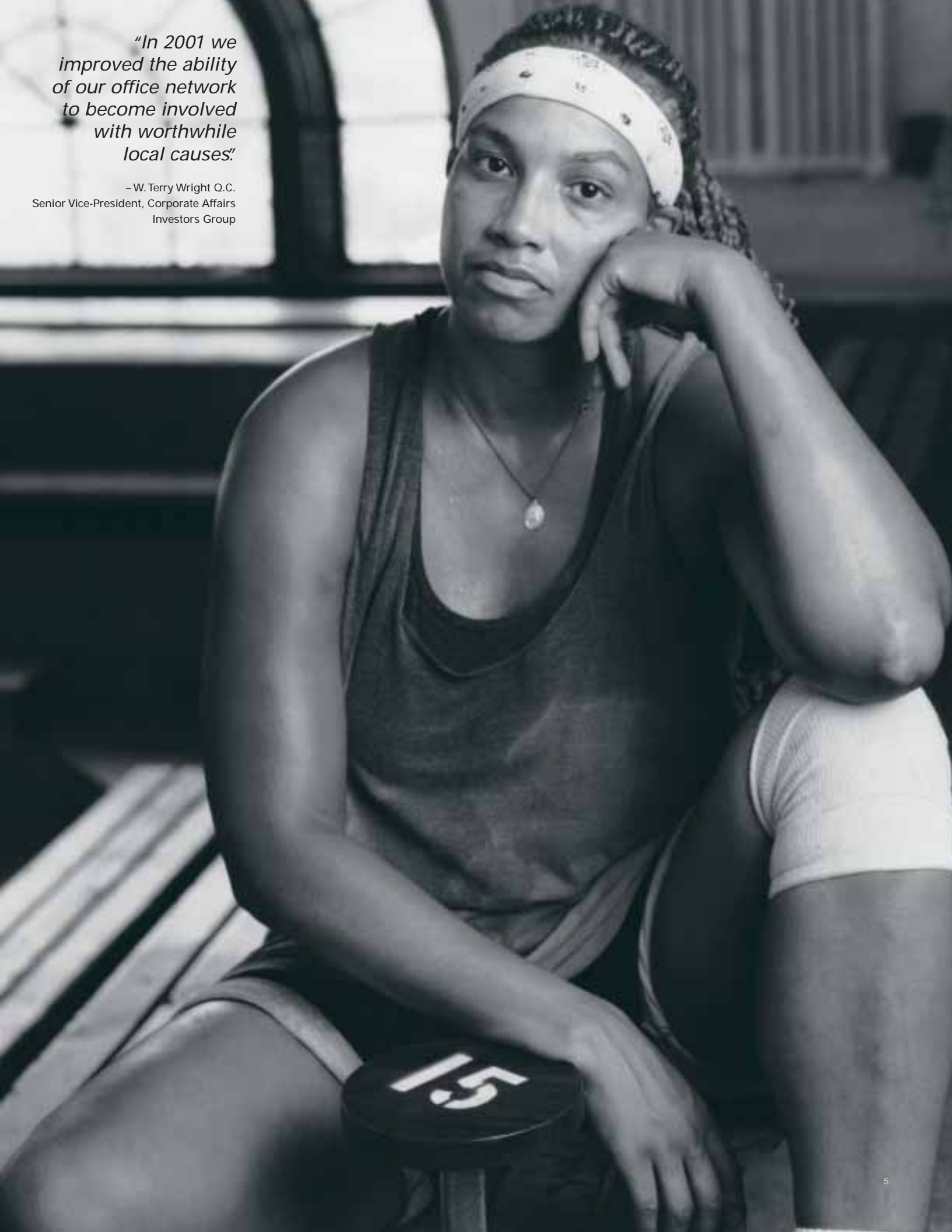

FOUNDATION FOR BAFFIN ISLAND CHILDREN ESTABLISHED BY INVESTORS GROUP CONSULTANT

“Daddy, aren’t there kids who don’t get as much as we do for Christmas?” This question was asked in 1991 by an 11-year-old Victoria girl named Janis. She was speaking to her father, Peter Clarke, an Investors Group Consultant since 1975. The answer came soon through a family friend, Dr. John McIntyre, a Victoria surgeon who regularly travelled north to provide medical services to remote communities. “Peter, I know just the spot for you,” said Dr. McIntyre. “As a matter of fact, it’s a place where children get nothing at all for Christmas.”

The place is Baffin Island, located in the eastern Arctic, about 5,000 miles from Victoria. It is home to 13,000 Inuit people, including 4,000 children. Few in the community have made a smooth transition from their traditional lifestyle. For employment, social services, standards of living—the opportunities are severely limited.

“When I understood the kinds of challenges those people were facing, it seemed to me that we could give them a bit of a lift on one day out of 365,” says Clarke. He came up with 75 Christmas gifts that first year, and distributed them through the local hospital. “The idea has kind of taken off since then,” he says. Ten years later, the cooperation of two airlines and a trucking company are required to get all of Peter Clarke’s Christmas presents up to Baffin Island. The gifts weigh a metric tonne, enough for 1,200 children throughout the entire eastern Arctic region.

Clarke had to establish a separate organization to handle all of the cash contributions that were being pressed on him by friends, business colleagues and clients. The registered charitable organization is known as the Tunijjusairut Foundation, taken from the Inuit word meaning, “giving a gift.” “So many people and organizations have stepped forward to help,” comments Clarke. “Air Canada, Canadian North, the Coman Arctic freight company, Zellers, the RCMP, the Social Services group for Baffin Region—it’s really a team effort.”

The project has grown in scope over the years. Toys are now being used by pediatricians for play therapy. Sewing machines have been donated to community facilities in all 13 communities of the Baffin region. A board of directors, including several Investors Group personnel, volunteers time and advice to keep the project heading in the right direction.

Investors Group has supported the foundation through corporate contributions and by matching donations. “But the thing I appreciate most about Investors Group is that it’s been a great place to work for over 25 years,” says Clarke. “The company and the community have been very good to me. That’s how I’m in a position to give a little back.” Call it “Tunijjusairut” from the heart.

Peter and Lois Clarke have eight children aged 9 to 29, four of whom were adopted. They have been foster parents to approximately 50 other children since 1985.



INVESTING IN EDMONTON KIDS THROUGH BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB

Boys and Girls Clubs of Canada assist approximately 130,000 children and youth each year. The Edmonton Club, founded 40 years ago and now operating in 12 locations across the city, is among the busiest anywhere in the country.

Investors Group has been a major supporter in Edmonton and throughout Alberta since 1999. A significant undertaking at that time was a public communications campaign, that Investors Group helped support in order to generate awareness and interest in the local Boys and Girls Club. We have maintained our involvement through sponsorships and other commitments for 2001 and future years.

Though Boys and Girls Club services are available to all youngsters, those who are most involved tend to be at risk due to various kinds of challenges—economic, family or personal. “I learned early on that kids needing a hand can originate from anywhere at all,” says Ric Wrobel, Regional Director, Edmonton Metro Region. “An issue for many is simply being left on their own a lot.”

Most recently, Investors Group has participated in projects like the Shares Exchange Program and the Caddie Classic golf tournament. These are fundraising initiatives with an important side benefit—creating opportunities for positive contact between children and community-minded business people.

“It’s quite an experience to spend a day walking around a golf course with one of these kids,” says Wrobel. “I think a lot of people learn a lot from it, even if it is just one day a year.”

According to Dru Edmiston, the community partnership with Investors Group is enhanced by volunteer participation. “Our Investors Group board members come with a wonderful entrepreneurial attitude,” she says. “They know what it means to go the extra mile.”

“In return, we’d like to say thank you to them for being willing to invest in kids and families in a way that makes a difference each and every day. We’ve known Investors Group for many years, as have so many other Canadians. We appreciate the fact that they’re a company who are in it for the long run.”

Ric Wrobel has volunteered to the boards of various Edmonton-based organizations, including the Boys and Girls Club of Edmonton, the Polish Heritage Society, Better Business Bureau and Spinal Cord Society.

INVESTORS GROUP MS BIKE TOUR RAISES \$250,000 FOR MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS IN SASKATCHEWAN

Multiple Sclerosis (MS) is an illness of the central nervous system. It disrupts the lives of hundreds of thousands of Canadians. Approximately 50,000 people are currently diagnosed with the disease. The lives of loved ones at home and friends in schools and workplaces are also affected, often dramatically.

The Multiple Sclerosis Society of Canada is committed to bringing hope to all whose lives have been upset by MS. Not surprisingly, raising funds is a vitally important component of fulfilling this vision.

Donations are used to support research into the cause of and potential cure for the disease. Funding to provide assistance directly to those suffering with MS can also be made available to help with the demands of day-to-day life, which range from special transportation needs to unique communication aids. In addition, there are vital information and awareness functions to support those personally impacted and to educate the general public.

For the third consecutive year, three midwest region offices pooled resources to host the Investors Group MS Bike Tour in Regina, Saskatoon, and Waskesiu. They raised over \$250,000 for the Saskatchewan Division of the MS Society of Canada, through the effort of hundreds of community volunteers.

“The MS Society is a wonderful partner for us,” says Gordon Guenther, Regional Director of Saskatoon Preston. “They understand how to work with businesses and they’re terrifically well organized.”

According to Mary Lou Van De Bon, Development Director for the Saskatchewan Division of MS Canada, support from Investors Group goes well beyond name association with the MS organization’s most significant fundraising event.

“Investors Group goes to great lengths to help us succeed,” she says. “They sit on our planning committee, create a spirit of enthusiasm and turn out for the Bike Tour in droves, bringing their families and friends along as well.”

In addition to serving on the Saskatoon United Way’s Board of Directors, Gordon Guenther coaches little league baseball and is active in the Canadian Association of Financial Planners, having served two terms as President of the North Saskatchewan Chapter.



ON THE FRONT LINES FOR THE UNITED WAY IN WINNIPEG

According to Patricia Herd, Manager, Program Administration, Community Affairs, Investors Group's financial support of community organizations often goes hand in hand with volunteer commitments of Consultants and employees.

"Investors Group has a mandate of supporting Canadian community life at the grassroots," she says. Often this support goes well beyond corporate funding. Personal donations can also be highly significant, since every dollar contributed by Investors Group people to registered Canadian causes is matched by the corporation, dollar for dollar.

In addition, hands-on volunteer commitments from Consultants and employees are considered to be most worthwhile. "We know from talking to non-profit organizations that donations of time and expertise are just as important as cash contributions, and often are more difficult to obtain," comments Herd.

The 2001 United Way of Winnipeg campaign shows how an integrated approach to community investment can make a meaningful impact for local social services.

More than \$350,000 was generated by Investors Group in Winnipeg, mostly as a direct result of internal volunteer activities. "We had approximately 100 Consultants, employees and retirees serve on our workplace campaign committees," says Lisa Bannatyne. "They promoted our payroll deduction and direct contribution programs and managed special fundraising events throughout the fall."

In addition, Investors Group continued our involvement in the United Way of Winnipeg's "Loaned Representative" program, in which leading companies donate 100 per cent of their personnel's time to directly participate in the United Way's fundraising campaign. The commitment is for a 14-week period, from September through December, and gives those involved a unique opportunity to make a real difference on behalf of the local community.

"If you believe in the idea of people helping people, you find yourself wanting to do something in a personal way," Bannatyne says.

The United Way of Winnipeg's fundraising campaign totalled \$12.9 million in 2001, exceeding the previous record by more than \$1 million.

Prior to joining Investors Group in 1996, Patricia Herd worked in the non-profit sector for nearly twenty years. She volunteers her time to support the Winnipeg Humane Society and the Manitoba Competitive Equestrian Organization.

Lisa Bannatyne was a United Way Loaned Representative volunteer in 2000. She became Employee Campaign Chair of the Investors Group United Way campaign in 2001.

FUTURE ACES PHILOSOPHY IS CREATING POSITIVE VALUES IN 100 ONTARIO SCHOOLS

Herb Carnegie was among the best Consultants that Investors Group ever had. He qualified for The Millionaire’s Club for 24 straight years. But that’s not what he’ll be remembered for; nor for the fact that racial bigotry denied him access to the National Hockey League during the 1940s and ‘50s. This has been well acknowledged by the likes of Jean Beliveau and Punch Imlach—and though it’s integral to his story, his legacy is about something else.

Instead, Herb Carnegie, age 82, is known today and will be remembered in future for his contribution to community citizenship in this country.

Over 100 schools in the Toronto area have adopted his Future Aces philosophy and, since 1987, the Herbert H. Carnegie Future Aces Foundation has continued his visionary community work.

The 12-point Future Aces creed promotes the importance of personal ethics in day-to-day life. Starting with the words, “I will endeavour to develop a positive mental attitude toward all people and toward my work,” it goes on to underline such qualities as cooperation, courage, education, setting a good example and public service. It has been developed into a fully integrated life skills initiative, aimed at students in the classroom and at home.

Clayton Latouche, Administrator, York Region District School Board, recently said, “When all cultures, races and creeds come together and have a common language, it’s a wonderful thing. So Future Aces supports a diverse multicultural society and that is definitely what we’re all about.” According to Bernice Carnegie, the Foundation’s Executive Director, it can have dramatic effects in contemporary school situations. “School officials have told us that disciplinary issues have been reduced from five or six a day to five or six per month,” she says.

The Herbert H. Carnegie Future Aces Foundation also provides scholarships for deserving high school students.

With a \$50,000 community investment in 2001, Investors Group is the largest single private sector supporter of the Herbert H. Carnegie Future Aces Foundation. Funding has come through corporate community relations programs as well as special events created by the Toronto Region offices. “There is great potential for this movement, not just in Ontario, but across Canada,” says Mark de Hart, a colleague of Carnegie’s for 20 years. “We’re seeing kids do a lot better at home and at school because it helps give them practical, positive values.”

Mark de Hart has been an Investors Group Consultant since 1981. He has served as a volunteer board member to the Herbert H. Carnegie Future Aces Foundation for the past 10 years.



SUPPORTING FAMILY VALUES IN MONTREAL

Les Grands Ballets Canadiens de Montreal has presented Tchaikovsky's Christmas classic, *The Nutcracker*, through a major contribution from Investors Group in each of the last four seasons.

According to Martin Caron, investing in a high-profile performing arts project represents solid community programming for Investors Group. "It fits our interests very well," he says. "Les Grands Ballets Canadiens is a remarkable arts organization. It has attracted senior people as volunteers, including our own personnel, and has a very important audience, especially for *The Nutcracker*."

Appealing to sophisticates and novices alike, *The Nutcracker* has probably introduced more children and families to classical dance than any other single piece. It is superb entertainment for audiences of all ages.

This strong family orientation presented a complementary opportunity in 2001. Another citizenship priority for Investors Group in Quebec is The Lighthouse, Children and Families, a community project for families with children suffering from life-threatening illnesses.

Though future plans include a full-time residential facility, The Lighthouse devotes current efforts to helping with sick children at home, allowing other family members time to see a show or have a meal out. Even a few recreational hours on a regular basis can offer significant relief to those involved.

Since our sponsorship included a private corporate performance of *The Nutcracker*, Investors Group personnel hit on the idea of providing tickets for Lighthouse volunteers to sell in the community, with all proceeds being returned directly to the organization.

"In our minds, there was a connection between Christmas, *The Nutcracker* and The Lighthouse," comments Caron. "It's the idea of family and children, and how important they are to us all."

A crowd of 2,000 packed Place des Arts on December 14 for the special Investors Group presentation of *The Nutcracker*, including Consultants, employees, present and future clients, as well as approximately 1,000 people attending in direct support of The Lighthouse. Investors Group took the opportunity to present the organization with a cheque for \$40,000, resulting from the ticket sales drive as well as significant region office contributions.

Martin Caron helps manage Investors Group community relations programming in Quebec. "I feel it is important that regional people have the flexibility to work with major local organizations that can have the most impact," he says.

JUNIOR ACHIEVERS LEARN THE ROPES IN NEWFOUNDLAND

Keith Cormier believes in Junior Achievement because he feels it adds a necessary dimension to the experience of high school students. “Millions of dollars are spent providing children with a general education, yet comparatively little is allocated to teach them how to earn a living,” he says.

“That’s where the value of Junior Achievement lies. It serves a practical purpose in our community.”

In Corner Brook, Investors Group is primarily involved with a Junior Achievement program called the Business Game, in which teams of high school students compete in a high-tech industry simulation to learn such basics as setting prices, managing production, product marketing and research/development.

Participation gives students a practical learning environment not only in terms of new information and concepts, but in terms of personal attitude and orientation as well. Such business-minded programming can have far-reaching consequences by providing a positive influence on young people in preparation for their future life as part of the working world.

A significant feature of this Junior Achievement exercise is the active input of successful professionals representing the local business community, who contribute their own time to serve as mentors and coaches to student teams.

“Probably 60 per cent of the Junior Achievers coaches for this particular program came from our region office,” explained Cormier. “Our people are all successful entrepreneurs in their own right and can be a bit competitive by nature. As a result, they offered some good experience to the students and had a great time themselves.”

In addition to providing volunteer time and expertise, Investors Group was a major corporate sponsor of Junior Achievement in Newfoundland and Labrador.

“The economic engine of Canada is driven by small businesses,” comments Cormier. “I think that Junior Achievement can make a tremendous contribution to that segment, particularly in our part of the country.”

Junior Achievement is well established in Newfoundland and Labrador, serving over 4,000 students in 52 elementary, junior high and high schools across the region.

Keith Cormier has been a volunteer board member for the Environmental Resources Management Association as well as the Salmon Preservation Association for the Waters of Newfoundland. He is credited with originating the Exploits Valley Salmon Festival, one of the top community festivals in North America. Mr. Cormier was recently seen onstage in “Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat”, a community play by Theatre Newfoundland & Labrador.



INVESTORS SUMMA IS THE LARGEST SOCIALLY RESPONSIBLE INVESTMENT FUND IN CANADA

The history of the socially responsible investment (SRI) mutual fund business in this country is one of rapid growth—from \$100 million in 1989 to over \$4.5 billion in 2001, according to Michael Jantzi Research Associates, a Toronto-based consulting firm recognized for its expertise in the field. In fact, over the past two years alone, SRI mutual funds grew about four times faster than the industry in general.

Investors Group’s SRI fund, known as Investors Summa, is among the most well established socially responsible funds in Canada. Founded in 1987, Investors Summa has in excess of \$2.5 billion under management, making it significantly larger than most of the other 30 or so SRI funds currently offered in Canada.

“Very few Canadians want to make money in a way that is inconsistent with their own moral standards,” comments Scott Penman, President and Managing Partner, IG Investment Management Ltd. “As a result, investing with a high sense of social responsibility is an extremely important part of what we do.”

Two standards for excellence

A long-term capital growth oriented fund, Summa invests primarily in Canadian corporations that are evaluated on financial terms as well as for their performance on various social criteria. These include product screens—tobacco, alcohol, gambling, nuclear energy and others—as well as corporate behaviour covering such issues as employee relations, ethical business practice, human rights and safety.

According to Penman, the SRI formula is not about finding a happy medium between the financial side of the business and the ethical side. “A good fiscal track record can’t compensate for a poor performance in social terms,” he explains. “We are vigilant about ensuring exacting measures on both sides of the equation.”

Because evaluations are implemented from a dual perspective, the management of an SRI fund is at least as demanding as a traditional portfolio, though the results can be highly satisfying. “Where I can, I like to invest our capital in ways that will help people,” says Scott Morrison, Investors Summa Fund Manager. “With Summa, I’m proud to say that we’re participating with companies that really do add value. These are well-run businesses that are also giving something back.”

Scott Penman has volunteered for Big Brothers, The Canadian Cancer Society and The Manitoba Children’s Museum in addition to coaching children’s ringette and hockey. “I admire the disciplined approach we take regarding the kinds of causes we support,” he says. “It’s thoughtful and fits with the company’s culture generally.”

Scott Morrison coaches his children’s hockey and soccer teams. “There’s a wholesome, family-oriented element of our corporate culture that I find quite consistent with the aims of a fund like Investors Summa,” he says.

“Socially responsible investment is the integration of social and environmental criteria into the traditional investment decision-making process. Whether large institutions or individuals, social investors believe in using economic and market levers to encourage corporate responsibility and positive social change.”

HONOURING THE RULES

Most Canadian industries are extensively regulated these days, perhaps none more than the financial services sector. Such regulation is the inevitable product of both the size and importance of this part of the economy. It serves to protect consumers and industry professionals alike, by helping to establish the reliability of the financial services sector in general.

As a result, compliance has become an important discipline in its own right. "We endeavour to ensure that Investors Group can be counted upon at all times to fulfill its professional responsibilities for the benefit of our own people and for our clients," says David Cheop. "For example, client information is crucial to the financial planning process. By definition, this information is of a most personal and sensitive nature. Such information can only come to us as an outgrowth of relationships based solidly on professional trust and confidence."

According to Cheop, while regulations governing financial industry standards are stringent and increasingly formalized, personal initiative and professional excellence still play a key role in how well a company performs on its obligations. "We've always felt that we are committed to living up to the spirit as well as the letter of the law," he says. "We go above and beyond where we can to ensure the highest ethical standards possible."

Codes of conduct

Investors Group has also developed internal measures that promote a corporate environment emphasizing integrity and reliability, including a strict business code that governs proper conduct in such general areas as individual rights, conflicts of interest and client confidentiality, with additional policies governing specific topics ranging from hiring practices to day by day dealings between Consultants and clients. Portfolio managers and others in particularly sensitive positions have special policies in place to guide conduct in their areas.

"These are all clear and focused guidelines," comments Cheop. "Taken together, they are the key elements that underpin an ethical and professional organization, one that people can count on to provide advice that is accurate and trustworthy."

David Cheop volunteers to the Winnipeg Chinese Cultural Centre as Honourary Solicitor and serves on the boards of both the Hong Kong Canada Business Association and the Winnipeg Jazz Orchestra. "I think it's important that Investors Group supports a very wide range of non-profit organizations throughout the country. Some may be small in size, but are no less significant in terms of enriching their community."
